Reading – Matthew 28: 16-20 and Mark6: 7-13

Main message of this talk in one sentence Go and make disciples of all people...

There are two 'tracks' that define our lives:

- 1. Greatest Commandment
- 2. The Great Commission

This week looked at the Great Comisssion

Jesus called people to follow him and invited them to spend time with him. Much like a rabbi of that time, the disciples learned from Jesus by his teaching, by his actions and through the opportunity to practise.

Jesus sent the 12 out in Mark 6 and they did the same thing as Jesus had been doing with them. Later the 12 had become 72 and, again, they were sent out to do the same thing – to go and make disciples.

In the build up to and the commission of his disciples, Jesus did three things:

- 1. He spent time with this followers
- 2. He gave them authority
- 3. He sent them out they had to go to the people!

As followers of Jesus, we are called into a covenant relationship with God and are commissioned to go and make disciples. These twofold tracks are expanded in our vision as connect, grow and influence.

To fulfil this twofold call upon every Christians life we need to function in community. Community allows us to love God with our strength, heart, mind and soul. Community also encourages us in our God given purpose through the discipline of others.
